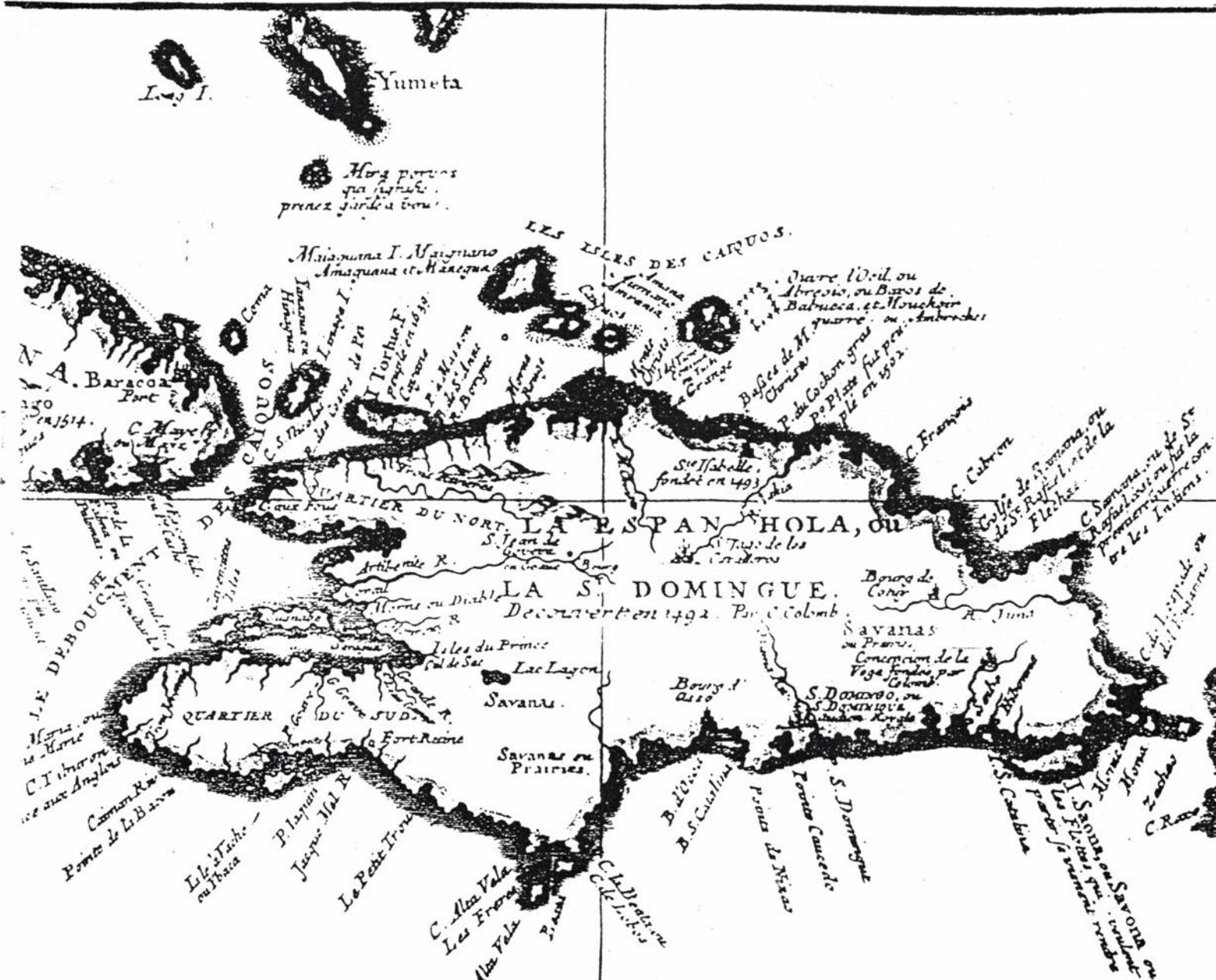


# CARIBBEAN HISTORICAL & GENEALOGICAL JOURNAL

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#### Genalogical Tidbit

The following list contains the names of some of the French and Spanish who left St. Domingue and Santo Domingo after the ceding of the Spanish side under the Treaty of Basil and the various slave revolutions on the French side. In some cases, the destination is not known, though most went from St. Domingue to Santo Domingo. Some went on to La Habana, Spain or the United States.

Madame DUHART TREMAIS, arrived La Habana aboard San Lorenzo after January 1796 with relatives Juan CHASSERAUX and J.B. HUBERT. She was a widow and had six children.

Maria Merced BOBADILLA daughter of Francisca DE FROMETA, widow of Nicolás GIRON. Also, Antonia and Ana Teresa DE MUESES, widows.

Nicolas DE SOTO, priest.

Lope LUCENA, married with 2 daughters.

On 9 January 1796 arrived at La Habana some "negros auxiliares" or auxiliary colored troops: Jean Francois, Benjamin, Bernardino, Agapito, Ambrosia NOESI, Lequi, LEFEBRE, WATABLE, BASANA, DELIE, PERRO, GIL, DESEMBRAY, Hiler SABANO, Paul PICARD.

It is obvious from the above list that the surnames of some were not given or ignored. Additionally, some of the surnames given, such as PERRO, are hardly discernable as to their root surname. In this case, the correct surname is probably PERRAULT.

Juana RODRIGUEZ and Alberta PADRON, both widows, arrived at La Habana aboard the San Cristóbal.

Jose del Rosario DEL CASTILLO emigrated in October 1803 at the age of 90 and went to live in Guanabacoa, Cuba with a relative named Maria HINOJOSA.

Francisco AGAPITO, Mayor General of the colored troops, born in Plaisance, St. Domingue went from Cadiz, Spain to La Habana on the ship Jupiter which sailed Spain on 24 December 1813. With him were his wife, Juana Andrea CUPIDON, 51 years old; a widow named Maria Francisca CONNET, born in Les Cayes, 37 years old; Clara GENNISON, North American, 37 years old; Maria PIPE, born in Africa, 25 years old; Pable FERRE, her husband, born-Guadeloupe, 35 years old.

Juan SANAN married Clara Victoria LUCAS on 13 July 1813. She was born in St. Domingue and was mulatto. They had a daughter named Maria del Carmen.

In 1814, arrived in Puerto Rico aboard the ship Mariana - Ayudante Sofrin AJOR; his wife-Maria COUTURA; private-Santiago LORENZO; private-Juan PERRO MEADE; Genoveva Cecilia DEODORE; Maria Josefa ATOR, Maria LEDOR. Later, all went to Cuba.

Others who emigrated from Santo Domingo to Cuba - Jose FELIZ RAVELO, Gaspar DE ARREDONDO PICHARDO, born in Santiago de los Caballeros and lived in Puerto Principe; Juan DE MATA TEJADA; Jose Antonio BERNAL MUNOZ, Francisco MUNOZ DEL MONTE, poet; Manuel GARAY HEREDIA, Manuel FERNANDEZ DE CASTRO, Francisco Javier DE FOXA, Esteban PICHARDO, Manuel DE MONTEVERDE, Antonio DEL MONTE TEJADA, Javier GURIDI (returned to Santo Domingo); Alejandro GURIDI, brother of Javier; Fr. Tomás DE PORTES INFANTE, born in Santiago de los Caballeros, went in Bayamo in 1802, left in 1809; Jose Tiburcio STERLING, Dr. Pedro VALERA JIMENEZ, Domingo DIAZ PAEZ, Manuel MARQUEZ JOVEL, José Antonio FRANCO, José Cayetano PICHARDO, Santiago MARQUEZ, Sebastián PICHARDO TEJADA, Jose Francisco HEREDIA MIESES, Lucas PICHARDO CERECEDA, Felipe FERNANDEZ DE CASTRO, Dr. Juan Vicente MOSCOSO.

Dejeune DUHART, widow, owned a plantaion in St.Domingue in 1796. Her sister, Madame DUHART DE SAINT-GERMAIN, also a widow, had sought refuge with her at San Rafael.

To Maracaibo, Venezuela from Santo Domingo emigrated - Angel CERZANO, Leonardo DEL MONTE and Martin DE MUESES.

Other who emigrated from St.Domingue either to Santo Domingo and then to Cuba, directly to Cuba or even to Venezuela included:

Eustache Leroy DE LA VERDOUILLERE, owner of plantation Croix-des Bouquets, went to Puerto Cabello.

Paul GLEIZES DE MAISONCELLE, planter, went to Puerto Cabello.

Francois GARRAUD went to Puerto Cabello.

Rene MALLET from Port-au-Prince went to Santo Domingo then to the La Guira district of Santiago de Cuba where he started a coffee plantation.

LAMBERT in 1791 went to the Oriente province of Cuba with Louis BELLEGARDE.

Luis GALLIFET died in Santo Domingo in 1798. A daughter of Juan Bautista DE OYARZABAL married in 1853 to Jose Bernardo GALLIFET, son of Bernardo GALLIFET and Manuela DE MUESES.

Sebastian DESPUJEUX was a refugee in 1798 in Santo Domingo. In the parish of Santa Barbara records his surname is shown as DESPUJOS.

In 1795 D'ESPINVILLE went to Cuba and with the Marquis Joseph DE MESSEME started a coffee plantation near La Habana.

DUQUESNE, landowner in Gonaives went to Puerto Cabello.

MAGLOIRE was a butcher in Santiago de Cuba.

Nicolas ROBERT, Marquis de Cocherol, wife Francoise GALLIEN DE PREVAL - had plantations in Gonaives.

1804 FONTANGES solicits permission from the Spanish government to reside in Cuba with his wife and mother-in-law, Maria Margarita DESCAHAUT.
